

US Independence

We wish everyone a Happy Independence Day celebration this month. Here is a bit of US Independence Trivia:

Historians have long disputed whether Congress actually signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, even though Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, and Benjamin Franklin all later wrote that they had signed it on that day. Most historians have concluded that the Declaration was signed nearly a month after its adoption, on August 2, 1776, and not on July 4 as is commonly believed.

Coincidentally, both John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, the only signers of the Declaration of Independence later to serve as Presidents of the United States, died on the same day: July 4, 1826, which was the 50th anniversary of the Declaration. Although not a signer of the Declaration

of Independence, but another Founding Father who became a President, James Monroe, died on July 4, 1831, thus becoming the third President in a row who died on the holiday. Calvin Coolidge, the 30th President, was born on July 4, 1872, and, so far, is the only U.S. President to have been born on Independence Day. (Source: Wikipedia.org)

The Summer of 2016

No one expects tragedy to strike. It's not normal to live that way. Most days are predictably routine, and we expect our day to go as planned. When something unexpected happens, it can be enjoyable - like running into an old friend, or something we can laugh about later – like running out of gas. That's how most days go.

But the unexpected tragic or horrifying events, so many of which have happened recently, are not just unexpected, but just plain wrong.

We don't expect someone with a gun to open fire while waiting for an autograph after a concert or while dancing in a night club. We don't expect that an alligator is going to snatch a child from a lagoon inside a resort, or (going back a little further) that a wildfire would overtake 19 firefighters, that a plane is going to fly into a building or that a tire is going to blow on the freeway.

Many unexpected tragedies are accidental, but some, difficult as it is to imagine, are planned in advance; they're done intentionally.

This, of course, is not new. Cain, as we read in the first book of the Bible, intentionally killed his brother Abel. In today's society, however, whether tragedies occur in Orlando, Prescott, New York, London or Afghanistan, we hear about them immediately, and there are both positive and negative results of this.

One positive result of 24 hour news is that we have the ability to respond to tragedies faster than at any previous time in history. A negative result is

that we can become numb to these events because we hear about them faster than at any previous time in history.

People with good hearts and minds will always respond to tragedy with love, will ask questions about exactly what happened and how they can help, will want answers about how some people can commit such evil acts, and what can be done to prevent them from occurring again.

Christians must also respond with something more.

The gospel teaches us that we live in a fallen world, one in which the devil and his angels

relentlessly tempt us with lies and distortions with one purpose in mind: to turn us away from believing, trusting and loving God.

Christians must respond to a fallen world with love, with patience and with prayer. Evil is not going to go away, but it will certainly increase when we respond to evil

with evil and not love, when we lose faith and stop trusting in God's providence, and when we give in to the false notion that prayer cannot solve anything.

If there ever was a time to increase our presence at Sunday Divine Liturgies, to increase our personal prayers, and to increase our love for our brothers and sisters at home and throughout the world, it would have to be the summer of 2016.

Christians must respond to a fallen world with love, with patience and with prayer.

Adult Education


