






Christ is risen! Christos anesti!



And we need a gathering time



Building a New Church

Why has the estimated cost for our Church increased so much since November 18, 2007?

On Jan. 8, 2008, our contractor opened his portion of the Design Focus Group (DFG) meeting with the following words: "The best construction dollar that you can spend... is the dollar that you spend today." His statement was prophetic in every sense of the word. The four elements controlling the cost of a building are:

- 1. Unforeseen Conditions;
- 2. City Required code compliance and Fees;
- 3. Owner Revised or Added Design Elements; and
- 4. Inflation.

Unforeseen Conditions - Add \$350,000

When we began our planning last May, we also began investigating our soils for stability, strength, clay and deleterious material content. After analysis of our topsoil, the engineering quality indicated that the clay content is such that we must remove 3 to 4 foot of soil under the Church and replace this soil with engineered earth that will structurally support our four-story building. This process is expensive and necessary...this unforeseen condition increased our original estimate for our Church by \$350,000 to \$450,000 dollars. (HANSEN & CALLAHAN continue to work to bring down this cost.)

City Requirements, Codes, Fees – Add \$289.170

In December, Father

Michael, Kevin Callahan and
Mike Danielek met with the Community
Planning, Engineering and Fire Safety Departments for
the City of Peoria. The following items were not in our
original estimate and are required by the city in order to
build our new Church. (I know that Kevin Callahan and
LEMME Engineering are working diligently with the city
to curb these expenses.)

- 1. Updated 'ALTA Site Survey' Add \$1,500;
- 2. 'Final Plat Plan' Add \$4,410;
- 3. 'Traffic Impact Analysis' (TIA) Add \$8,260;
- 4. Fire lane around entire Church Add \$75,000;
- 5. Fire loop and hydrants for total site Add \$75,000;
- 6. Right Turn Lane on westbound Greenway Road to northbound 75th Avenue Add \$125,000.

Owner Revised or Added Design Elements - Add \$262,500

During the DFG meetings, parishioners requested several design additions and changes that increased the original estimate for the Church:

- 1. Barrel Roof and Vaulted Ceilings Add \$225,000;
- Added Bathrooms in Fellowship Hall Add \$16,000;
 and
- 3. In-ground Baptismal Font Add \$21,500.

Inflation – 34% to 45% Increase in Raw Materials – Add \$236,050 (to date)

Since January the cost of the steel for our new Church has increased by 34-percent with an additional 8-percent by August. Other percentage increases in construction materials since we began planning our Church are:

- 1. Cement has increased 45-percent;
- 2. Aluminum 33-percent;
- 3. Oil 33-perecent (plastic comes from oil and fuel for shipping materials to the site have skyrocketed); and
- 4. Copper 23-percent.

In the March 13 issue of *The Economist*, in an article titled, "The New Colonialists," China's hunger for natural resources is causing many inflationary problems in the construction industry. Half of all the

cement manufactured in the
world last year was purchased
and stock piled by the Chinese.
They have purchased vast
amounts of copper,
aluminum, steel and oil.

Experts in world commodities expect China's imports to triple in the near future...thus further cost increases in the very materials that we need to construct our Church.

How can we get our Church built?

This article ends the way it began.... "The best construction dollar that you can spend... is the dollar that you spend today." Lets all of us attach our prayers, hearts and ALL of our efforts to getting this project built as quickly as possible. "But Jesus looked at them and said to them, "With men this is impossible, but with God all things are possible." (Matthew 19:26)

Parish Stewardship

How does our church meet its operations budget? How do we support church ministries outside of our parish or throughout the world? How do we manage to send food to the West Side Food Bank, holiday food and gifts to needy families in Peoria, support a tutor at St. Innocent Orphanage in Tijuana through Project Mexico? The answer to those questions is always the same; from the voluntary offerings of our parishioners. And, thankfully, our history of giving to support the church operations budget and ministries - as well as to help meet needs outside our parish - has been steady and generous.

Many of our parishioners understand our Christian responsibility as good stewards; and it is more than simply offering a financial contribution. Stewardship teaches us to give generously of our time, our talents as well as our treasure (financial resources). When we collect food and gifts at the holidays, for example, volunteers are needed to sort and package food, wrap packages and deliver them either to the Food Bank or to the Community center. This all requires time, energy and, of course, a pleasant disposition. The rewards may not come in the form of a paycheck, but are more intangible such as, the knowledge that we are making a difference, enjoyable fellowship, helping worthy and needy causes.

Stewardship is the responsibility of all parish families. We ask each family to complete and return a Stewardship Pledge Card each year, and ask for a financial commitment to help cover the operating expenses of the church. The goal is to have stewardship contributions meet those operating expenses so that other income from festivals and other fund-raisers can help support local, national and international ministries of our church such as our Seminary, Missions Program and the IOCC (International Orthodox Christian Charities).

If you attend St. Haralambos Church, and have not yet sent in a Stewardship Pledge Card for 2008, please do so today. (Simply call or e-mail the church office for a card.) We are a growing parish and offer these thoughts as a reminder to families who have been with St. Haralambos Church for many years, as well as for our newer families.

Giving to the needs and ministries of the Church always has, and always will, depend on the generous hearts of its members. The more we consider how the love and mercy of Christ is immeasurable, and that the Church continues His saving mission, the more we recognize our responsibility in supporting our Church, cheerfully as well as obediently. (Next month: tithing and percentage giving – deciding how much to pledge)

<u>Living Responsibly in an Age of</u> <u>Excuses</u>, Anthony M. Coniaris, 1999, 73 pages.

Adam blamed Eve, Eve "blamed the serpent and the serpent didn't have a leg to stand on!" So begins the book, but even

before page one appears Psalm 51. Fr. Coniaris says there's no end to the "blame game" until, like David, we accept responsibility for our sins and blame only ourselves.

Closely tied to the "blame game" are the topics of "victimism" and "excuse abuse." A person fired for consistently arriving late, won his job back because he suffered from an ailment called "chronic lateness." An

inebriated man who fell in front of a subway train sued because the engineer should have stopped sooner and won. An old man was nearly killed and the perpetrator was awarded \$4.3 million because a policeman shot him in the back. Following the L.A. riots, lawyers successfully defended two men who were filmed crushing the skull of an innocent person with a brick since people can't be held accountable for getting caught up in mob violence. We have "no-fault" insurance and divorce.

Fr. Coniaris writes, "If we are victims of PMS or crack or sexual addiction or racism or whatever, then something or somebody else is always to blame."

Some contend that humans are products of their environments and their genetic inheritance. The author concedes that we don't fully understand to what extent these factors cause violence and immorality. But he argues that Adam and Eve lived in the most perfect environment,

and yet chose to sin against God.

Humans are the only animals capable of making excuses and of rationalizing that right is wrong and that evil is good. In fact, a common excuse for bad behavior is that I'm "only human," writes Fr. Coniaris. But Christ "came to show us what it means to be truly human."

Man is much more than an animal because he is

created in the image of God. Furthermore, we are lovingly created with free will. The author emphatically states that with "free will and the grace of God" we can "rise above any…environment…or genetic predisposition."

Like David we must put the blame squarely on our own shoulders. "For I know **my**...sin (not my neighbor's!) is ever before me."

Jesus made himself a scapegoat for our sins, but how can God forgive if we don't confess? Our lives change when we say "good-bye to self-pity, denial, pride...and passing the buck." We are reminded, "... the blood of Jesus cleanses only sins—not excuses."
