Parishioner Profile

Each month of 2012 we'll spend some time with a member of our parish to get their memories, views and insights about the history, development and future of our parish as part of this year's 25th Anniversary celebration. This month's interview is with **Kay Fulg**hum.

Question: How many years have you been a steward at St. Haralambos?

Answer: Four years.

Q: Where were you born and raised and what brought you to Arizona?

A: I'm not a native Arizonan, but have lived in the West all my life, in New Mexico, California and Arizona. The move to Arizona was prompted by the mid-70s economic recession where we left California and have been in Arizona ever since.

Q: What activities and groups have you been involved in at St. Haralambos?

A: When choir and chanter volunteers were asked for, I was happy to join these groups. While my work schedule at the library often is irregular and involves a lot of weekend shifts, I volunteer to help where I can such as with annual Greek Festival preparations.

Q: What do you like most about St. Haralambos parish and what it offers?

A: Our parish is blessed with a wonderful priest and a community that is not so big that one gets lost in it. The attitude of our parishioners is friendly and caring and I felt welcomed from my first day.



Q: What would you like to see happen in the next 5-10 years of our parish?

A: I see our actions coming to light from our recent spring General Assembly meeting with our discussion about our parish 'Vision Statement'. We can find our definition of a 'loving Christ-centered community' right in the Scriptures, in 1 Corinthians 13, verses 4-8. These statements about love provide all the vision necessary to find actionable things for us to do and for the benefit of those within and outside our parish. In

particular, that Scripture quote makes quite a statement about kindness. I'd love to start with those who need the kindness of our parish family the most and we can demonstrate our love for each other during the 40 days of prayers for the newly departed. Forty parishioners in turn, each willing to pray the Akathist for the Departed, on one of those important first 40 days. Whether volunteers pray alone or together as a family, for the benefit of one of our parish members, this kind of thing is our Christian heritage of mercy and love. Even people who cannot go to a funeral service, or who may not know the departed person, are too young to drive, or homebound, benefited from the kindness of the newly deceased or most importantly, who need to forgive that person, can contribute to this effort. Can you imagine how comforted family members would be, just knowing that our parish is gathered around them, praying in their turns, during those first 40 days? Can you imagine how activities like this define how we live within 'our parish community?' And, to help build that legacy, I am willing to organize a prayer group for this loving work.

The Day of Pentecost

The story of Jesus' earthly ministry and loving care for mankind does not end with His resurrection from the dead, and this month's celebration of the feast of Pentecost on Sunday, June 3rd, gives us further reason to acknowledge Him as the One who truly loves Mankind.

Although an unprecedented miracle in human history, the point of His resurrection was not just to show that the power of death had no effect on our Lord, but that He alone had power to destroy it for all his followers as well. This is why the Church refers to Him as the Giver of Life.

The discovery of the empty tomb by Mary Magdeline was lifealtering for her, yet she could not convince the other disciples who were not with her; they had to see it for themselves. A second-hand delivery of the message by human means alone was not enough.

Jesus Himself met personally with His disciples to convince them He actually had risen from the dead. A first-hand delivery of the message by Christ Himself was enough to convince, but Jesus would only walk the earth for 40 days before ascending to heaven. How many could He teach and convince?

Something else was needed; something that would help continue the spread of the gospel long after Jesus' ascension to heaven, long after the disciples themselves had fallen asleep in the Lord. If not, the Christian gospel would not reach beyond the walls of Jerusalem nor be remembered with life-changing intensity beyond the first century.

The answer was provided on the day of Pentecost, when thousands of Jews had gathered in Jerusalem to celebrate the holy feast. The answer comes from the throne of God, the sending of the Holy Spirit, whom, as Jesus had promised, "the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all things that I said to you." (John 14:26)

Is there any force on earth that can frustrate God's eternal plan of salvation? The disciples were in hiding in fear for their lives, with no plan of evangelization regarding the Good News of the Lord's Resurrection. God, once again, had to act on Man's behalf to bring about His divine plan of reconciliation, salvation, eternal life.

The Holy Spirit inspires the disciples on the day of Pentecost not only with the right words, but with never-before found courage to speak about eternal life in Christ, not just in Jerusalem, but spreading far and wide, into favorable and unfavorable towns and cities.

Good News, as the saying goes, travels quickly. Men, women and children hear the Good News, believe and are baptized into the Faith, and Christianity has never stopped growing throughout the world ever since.

The will of God can never be stopped or altered in any way. We can choose to be part of His plan of eternal life or not. The

doors of the Church forever remain open to all who make the decision to become part of God's plan for Mankind. His Son showed us the way by establishing the Church against which the gates of Hell will not prevail.

The Way is not easy; it is not a wide road and many will fall off. We need a guide to help us stay on this road, and we need the help of others. The guide is the Holy Spirit, and help comes from the Church – not a community of perfection, but one of struggle.

The struggle is a good one, and all are welcome.



<u>Practice of His Presence</u> by Anthony M. Coniaris, 1989

In Him was life and the life was the light of men. (John 1:4)

"Our Orthodox Christian faith is based on the Bible and on Sacred Tradition, but let us not forget that the Bible and Tradition become real when we experience God's presence and power and love personally in our lives." Author Anthony Coniaris firmly believes that until one *experiences* God their faith is reduced to mere explanations and abstract theories. This book describes active ways to keep us engaged with God so that we may feel His presence. Many of the methods recounted are drawn from the lives of numerous saints. The author cites many poems, psalms, quotes and prayers and provides examples for ways to experience God's presence.

"To practice the presence of God daily is to carry on a constant inner conversation with God...In the midst of the day's business to lift brief prayers of adoration and praise to God." The author reminds us that we don't have to wait until Sunday service to think of God. Thinking, praying to and feeling God can become a lifestyle. We don't need appointed times or specific places as the presence of God can be attained throughout the day wherever we are simply by turning all our thoughts to God.

Another way to practice God's presence is through silence. "Be still, and know that I am God." It is in solitude that one hears God, in the centeredness of a quiet mind. Whether it is near the beauty of a body of water or under a maze of stars, finding time to feel God's wonder brings us closer to a spiritual union with Him. Coniaris quotes St. Isaac the Syrian as saying, "the highest form of prayer is to stand silently in awe before God."

God's presence is also felt through scripture. There are many ways to read the Word of God in the Bible. The author cites St. John Cassian's recommendation of frequent repetition of a verse from the Psalms, or Ignatius of Loyola who recommends taking a scene from the life of Christ and reliving it as if it were actually occurring and you were a participant. Developing a habit of daily spiritual reading, even as little as 15 minutes a day, can restore us and create spiritual discipline.

"Breathing may also be used as an aid in practicing the Presence...when breathing in, we may pray, Lord, I breathe in your breath which is the Holy Spirit....when breathing out, we may pray, Lord, I breathe out every sin and passion of my life..." Finding a quite place to practice breathing or meditating while reflecting on our Lord and His mercy is a way to pay inner attention and feel God's presence within us.

We can also practice the presence of God throughout the year by our church participation. "Through the events of the liturgical year, we actually relive with Christ the great events of His life...we reenter each event in such a way that it becomes a unique and refreshingly new act of salvation for us today."

The author concludes with this insight: "it is by practicing the presence of God that the presence becomes real. Why practice the presence? The person who needs the fire must fan it. Practicing the presence of God is fanning the fire of God's presence in us. By so doing we shall become like the person described by St. Anthanasius: He endeavored each day to present himself as the sort of person ready to appear before God."

Sunday of All Saints Sunday, June 10

The first Sunday after the Feast of Holy Pentecost is observed by the Orthodox Church as the Sunday of All Saints. This day has been designated as a commemoration of all of the Saints, all the Righteous, the Prophets, Apostles, Martyrs, Confessors, Shepherds, Teachers, and Holy Monastics, both men and women alike, known and unknown, who have been added to the choirs of the Saints and shall be added, from the time of Adam until the end of the world, who have been

perfected in piety and have glorified God by their holy lives.

Background

Honoring the friends of God with much reverence, the Prophet-King David says, "But to me, exceedingly honorable are Thy friends, O Lord" (Ps. 138:16). And the Apostle Paul, recounting the achievements of the Saints, and setting forth their memorial as an example that we might turn away from earthly things and from sin, and emulate their patience and courage in the struggles for virtue, says, "Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us

lay aside every burden, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us" (Heb. 12:1).

This commemoration began as the Sunday (Synaxis) of All Martyrs; to them were added all the ranks of Saints who bore witness (the meaning of "Martyr" in Greek) to Christ in manifold ways, even if occasion did not require the shedding of their blood.

Therefore, guided by the teaching of the Divine Scriptures and Apostolic Tradition, we honor all the Saints, the friends of God, for they are keepers of God's commandments, shining examples of virtue, and benefactors of mankind. Of course, we honor the known Saints especially on their own day of the year, as is evident in the Menologion. But since many Saints are unknown, and their number has increased with time, and will continue to increase until the end of time, the Church has appointed that once a year a common commemoration be made of all the Saints.

This is the feast that we celebrate today. It is the harvest of the coming of the Holy Spirit into the world; it is the "much fruit" brought forth by that "Grain of wheat that fell into the earth and died" (John 12:24); it is the glorification of the Saints as "the foundation of the Church, the perfection of the Gospel, they who fulfilled in deed the sayings of the Savior" (Sunday of All Saints, Doxastikon of Vespers).

In this celebration, then, we reverently honor and call blessed all the Righteous, the Prophets, Apostles, Martyrs, Confessors, Shepherds, Teachers, and Holy Monastics, both men and women alike, known and unknown, who have been added to the

choirs of the Saints and shall be added, from the time of Adam until the end of the world, who have been perfected in piety and have glorified God by their holy lives. All these, as well as the orders of the Angels, and especially our most holy Lady and Queen, the Evervirgin Theotokos Mary, do we honor on this day, setting their life before us as an example of virtue, and entreating them to intercede in our behalf with God, Whose grace and boundless mercy be with us all. Amen.



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
