

Mission Statement

"Activities of the committee will focus on the establishment of Money Earning Projects for the Building Fund. Total support is solicited to guarantee our Building Program success."

Committee

John Obren, who helped organize the early and accelerated pay-off of our Mortgage and the property at 75th Ave. & Greenway Road, will direct our fund raising committee. John's immediate goal is to raise building funds as quickly as possible so that we can begin building our new Church Home. John is looking for motivated volunteers to assist his committee in this exciting endeavor.

Mike Danielek is the co-chair. John has already begun to design a ½ page advertisement soliciting donations from every Greek Orthodox Community in the United States that will appear in the November 'Orthodox Observer'. He is assisted by Nick Milonas, who brings his technological expertise to St. Haralambos's fund raising activities.

Objectives of the Fund Raising Committee

The objectives of this new and exciting monthly report will be to:

- 1. Motivate, solicit and energize our parishioners to submit a 'Building Fund' pledge;
- 2. Promote and solicit donations from each Greek Orthodox Parish in North America and the 686,910 readers of the 'Orthodox Observer' beginning this November, 2009. John has solicited and successfully received the \$2,200 needed to advertise in the 'Observer':
- 3. Create, design and implement fund raising activities throughout the year in order to maintain and create enthusiasm for the fund raising activities (something new every 3 months);
- 4. Promote cash raffles 3 times per year beginning May 3rd with our first \$10,000 CASH raffle (2nd Prize: \$3,000; and 3rd Prize: \$2,000. (Only 500 tickets, per

- raffle, will be sold). Total funds per year for the 3 raffles could amount to \$105,000 to the 'building fund';
- Generate and petition donations (Commemoratives)
 for the Iconography, Liturgical Furniture, educational
 furniture and equipment to furnish our new Church
 building and Worship, Fellowship, Administrative and
 Educational spaces;
- To support the awareness of the need for additional building funds to be used for the future planning and construction of the new Church and Educational Building(s);
- 7. Keep our parishioners informed on a month-to-month basis. The committee will be available to answer questions at anytime. Please contact John Obren at: jpobren2@cox.net or Mike Danielek at: mdanielek1@cox.net

Status of the Fund Raising Capital Campaign to Date

Our previous fund raising committee generated approximately \$600,000 in pledges. We thank Peter Retsinas and Bill Retsinas for their success to date.

Though we had initial success, our campaign has stalled at 52 Campaign Pledges. Despite the fact that current economic times are difficult, please consider submitting a pledge form as soon as you possibly can. We will need your pledges to begin the application process for the construction loan. We need as many of you as possible, to underwrite a pledge as speedily as possible.

We must now stimulate our campaign!

During our previous successful fund raising drives, the total support percentage of our Stewardship pledges was over 60%. Presently, we have only 35% participation of our Stewards supporting the Project (Building Fund). We really need your help at this moment.

What Happened After the Resurrection



What happened after the Resurrection of Jesus Christ? What did his disciples do? Where did they go? How did the church begin? These questions, and more, are answered in a very important New Testament book, called the Acts of the Apostles. (Excerpts from the Book of Acts are read each Sunday during the Easter season.) It was written by St. Luke, author of the third Gospel, and, like a good historian, his intent was to write about the events of Christ and the apostles, after the resurrection.

It's an amazing story that begins with Jesus' ascension into heaven and continues with the feastday of Pentecost. We learn that on Pentecost, about 3,000 people were baptized! They didn't use baptismal fonts as we do today; they found locations along river banks or streams as John the Baptist did.

St. Luke then goes on to speak about how the apostles began traveling into different cities to teach about the resurrection of Christ, and to establish churches — not buildings, but groups of people

that believed in Jesus Christ as the Son of God. These early Christian communities usually met in houses or in catacombs (underground cemeteries), but secretly, because they could be arrested at any time for believing in Jesus.

Then in the 9th Chapter, we learn about St. Paul, who before his baptism, was capturing and arresting many Christians. He has a dramatic change-of-life event, and the remaining 19 chapters of the Book of Acts center on his thousand-mile long journeys to spread the Christian Gospel and establish more and more churches. It is this same St. Paul who authored nearly twothirds of the New Testament, with his letters (epistles) to the churches he established.

There are many other early Christian writers who describe the life of the Christian Church, mostly through letters, and other historians (both Christian and Jewish) that document events in early Christian history. One of the most ancient is, The Teaching of the Twelve Apostles, dating from the 2nd century AD. Here we read about the early

Christian liturgy (centuries before St. John Chrysostom) and about the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion.

It was very dangerous for Christians to openly acknowledge their faith in Christ, as we do today. There was always the fear of persecution, imprisonment, even death. It wasn't until Emperor Constantine the Great, in the early 4th century, not only legalized Christianity, but made it the official religion of

the Roman Empire.

Nothing in the history of mankind has been able to stop the spread of the Christian gospel.

Today, during the Easter season, we boldly proclaim, "Christ is risen!" But we should also remember that throughout Christian history — in some places, continuing to this day - Christians do so at great risk.

Nothing in the history of mankind has been able to stop the spread of the Christian gospel. May we never take it for granted, and continue, as did the earliest Christians, to keep our faith in God strong and vibrant.

Briami

(Tourlou)

Ingredients

1 Lg. Eggplant

2 Med. Zucchini

3 Ribs Celery

1 Lg. Onion

1 Lg. Potato

2 Cloves Garlic (minced)

1/3 Cup Veg. Oil

8 oz can Tomato Sauce

1 Cup Water

2 Bay Leaves

Salt & Pepper to taste

Directions

Cut vegetables into bite-size pieces and toss with oil, tomato sauce and water. Season with salt and pepper. Pour all into baking pan and top with bay leaves. Bake uncovered in preheated 400 oven for 1 hour, stirring occasionally. Then cover pan with aluminum foil and continue baking at 350 for an additional 60-90 minutes till vegetables are tender.

St. Christopher's Bookstore

Frank Schaefer, <u>Letters to Father</u>
<u>Aristotle: A Journey through</u>
<u>Contemporary American Orthodoxy</u>, 1995, 213pp.

Bishop Basil (Antiochian Orthodox Archdiocese) describes this book as "a wake up call...to face positive and negative realities of our world which...are impacting the Church."

Archbishop Dimitri (Orthodox Church of America) says Frank Schaeffer is one of

the "prophetic voices" calling us to realize that "forces of this world...want to destroy the Church [and] the precious Truth...entrusted to her [which] is essential for the life of the world...and this cannot be mitigated. These voices will offend—so be it!"

Bishop Isaiah (Greek
Orthodox Diocese of Denver)
insists, "If the reader believes
in the one Church, which the
Lord Jesus Christ established...,then the
reader must read this book."

As the title suggests, Mr. Schaeffer addresses various issues of faith and tradition by answering questions posed to a "Fr. Aristotle". The creation of Fr. Aristotle and the letters written to him are clever devices which make the book very readable, not didactic or pedantic.

Here are some of the topics listed in the "Table of Contents" and quotes from those letters.

VI Politics and the Orthodox Church

People "may gain some short term advantage for...the Greek community by playing politics with the Orthodox Church, but in the long run the Church will be the loser."


VIII The answer to discouragement

"Along with having unique ability to contemplate...comes unique responsibility to learn...what is truly real...and sacred in this life."

XII Bringing Orthodox prodigals back to Church - Revitalizing the Orthodox Church in the West

"I do not long for more of what Hollywood...can offer. I long for what the Orthodox Church alone can offer—the

Truth and forgiveness."
"Young people must be taught that the "Church is against abortion,...euthanasia, [and] fetal experimentation. We must teach them the holiness of life."

XIV Mistaken premise of the secular environmental movement

"Modern environmentalists borrow...moral language...

from our Christian religious system when it is convenient while denying the ultimate truth of that system."

Mr. Schaeffer's writing is very direct, blunt, maybe even offensive to some readers—but never boring.

Stewardship

Although they are different terms, the concepts of Stewardship and Tithing are the same. The fact remains that the minimum Biblical standard of giving is the tithe. Stewardship comes from the Greek word "oikonomia", or economy, which means management of the house or household. In the New Testament, it means man's management of his whole life in response to God's love.

The modern use of the word Stewardship can be justified by St. Paul's use of the term "oikonomia" when he writes in First Corinthians, "For if I do this willingly, I have a reward; but if against my will, I have been entrusted with a stewardship." (1Corinthians 9:17)


Man is a steward, a manager of the "time", "talents" and "treasures" that God

has given to him. God as Creator gives us time by granting us life, our very existence. God as Giver of all gifts, grants us our abilities and talents. God as Maintainer, provides for our needs by affording us opportunities to earn a living.

If I believe that God is the Giver, the Owner, and I the manager, then it follows that a Steward trusts the Bible's directions on how to manage God's gifts. God expects us to give Him thanks by managing our gifts of "time", "talent" and "treasure" according to His will.

"More is required for the person to whom more is given..." (Luke 12:48) The more we have been blessed, the more we are expected to return back to Him. The more we return those blessings, the more we will receive. That is the Orthodox way of life!
