

## Gratitude for Lent and Holy Week Services



Unless you are watching behind the scenes throughout Great Lent and Holy Week, you would not realize how many people are involved to prepare for these services, which were held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday evenings, and every evening during Holy Week.

When parishioners arrive for services, for example, someone has already arrived to open up the church, turn on the Heat (and AC as Spring arrived), the lights and sound system. Icons have been set up and decorated, service books are placed by the candle stands, the chanters and readers, according to the schedule, are at their places, along with Parish Council members and altar servers.

The turn-out for Tuesday evening Compline Services was much higher this year — could it have been the film series on the lives of the Saints of the Church which followed the service? The Lenten dinners following the Wednesday evenings Liturgies were wonderful — great variety

and beautifully prepared.

The Social hall, nicely decorated for our 25th Anniversary, was always ready with coffee and refreshments, every Sunday. Apostollos Koufallakis, and our Philoptochos prepared a fantastic dinner for all who attended from the various parishes. # 25th Anniversary

### Parishioner Profile

Each month of 2012 we'll spend some time with a member of our parish to get their memories, views and insights about the history, development and future of our parish as part of this year's 25th Anniversary celebration. This month's interview is with **Lee Vordos**.

# Question: How many years have you been a steward at St. Haralambos?

**Answer:** About two years.

# Q: Where were you born and raised and what brought you to Arizona?

A: I was born in Salt Lake City, Utah and became an electrical design engineer and was a manufacturer's representative for 39 years representing various electrical products companies. I served a large regional territory in the west and we used two offices to work out of with one in Salt Lake City and the other office in Scottsdale. In the middle 1980's we settled in Scottsdale and used that office as my home base. We attended St. Katherine's Church in Chandler at that time as it was the closest Church because Assumption in Scottsdale was not yet a community. Afterwards, as Assumption started up and that Church was closer to our home, we became stewards at Assumption when it started in the home on the Cactus Road property where they have built the Church today. I was involved in many activities including Parish Council Vice President in our 10 years at Assumption. My wife Dottie and I then moved to Fort Lauderdale, Florida for six years before returning to Arizona in 2007.

# Q: What activities and groups have you been involved in at St. Haralambos?

**A:** I am currently a member of the Parish Council and serve as an altar server to Fr. Michael during Divine Liturgy services. I enjoy the people, everyone is friendly and I enjoy serving with Fr. Michael because he is one of the best priests that I have had the pleasure to serve.

# Q: What are some of your memories of the founding of the parish?

**A:** I remember attending a very nice banquet that was held to celebrate the naming of this Church for St.

Haralambos. It was one of the first events that they had and we were excited that we were invited to attend.

# Q: What would you like to see happen in the next 5-10 years of our parish?

A: I hope we make even greater strides to grow the young families of our parish with activities and expand the programs we have now while creating new programs to help kids be involved, learn and grow.

Q: What legacy would you like today's parishioners to develop and leave for future generations during the next 25 years?

**A:** We need to build a Byzantine-style Church to worship in on the property

we have now so that we become a testament to the people that founded this parish and we can leave for future generations as the only Greek Orthodox Church in the West Valley.

# Q: Anything else you would like to share?

A: We have a great future ahead of us with many new and young families. We need to keep the young kids involved and have everyone's input and involvement so the Parish Council members and Fr. Michael together can make decisions needed to guide our parish today and for the long term.

## Sale Greenway Property

At our April 1st Special General Assembly, our Church Family took a significant step towards securing the financial position of our Parish. The Assembly voted <u>unanimously</u> to accept the offer we received to purchase the land owned by the Parish at 75th and Greenway Ave. We anticipate a successful close on the transaction later this summer.

This sale is significant to our Parish in a number of ways:

- The burden of the mortgage we took on to move into our current building has resulted in very little operating budget leeway. In 2011, after applying all proceeds from the Taste of Greece Festival and all other income received. including the Building Fund, we essentially broke even. And, we began 2012, projecting a budget deficit of over \$16,000. The opportunity to apply proceeds from the sale to pay down our mortgage balance will enable us to re-finance the mortgage this year and take advantage of historically low interest rates. The expected lower monthly payments will allow us added flexibility and protects us in the unlikely event of a significant unexpected income shortfall.
- By refinancing the mortgage this year, we will be able to save significant dollars in ongoing mortgage interest

- expense. Applying the net proceeds of over \$360,000 will allow us to save hundreds of thousands of dollars over the amortized mortgage term. We anticipate saving well over \$500,000.
- Finally, after applying the proceeds of the sale and refinancing this year, the mortgage can potentially be paid off a full ten years sooner. This is significant in that our Leap of Faith was to build a Byzantine-style sanctuary as our future church home. The reality is, until the current mortgage is paid off, that vision remains only a dream. The ability to retire the mortgage earlier may allow for many of our parishioners to see that new church edifice built in their lifetimes!

Over the next several months we encourage all Parishioners to prayerfully consider giving as much as possible to help us pay down the mortgage to an even greater extant before we refinance. The effect will be to reduce our overall interest expense by an even greater amount and allow us to anticipate paying off the existing mortgage at an even earlier date.

On the day that we burn the current mortgage we will turn the page and open the next chapter in the story of our Leap of Faith.

Future decisions about how we will "proclaim our Orthodox Christian Faith" and what we will do as a Church Family to be "a living presence to those around us" will be grounded in this statement.

## St. Christopher's Bookstore

**Spiritual Counsels**, **select passages from** *My Life in Christ* by Father John of Kronstadt, edited by W. Jardine Grisbrooke, 1989

"Behold, Satan hath desired to have you....but I have prayed for thee, that thy faith fail not."

This book is a compilation of passages which have been edited and translated from the Russian novel, *My Life in Christ*. They reflect Father Kronstadt's passionate teachings which brought remarkable healing to thousands during times of suffering, revolution, and upheaval in nineteenth century Russia. As the title reflects, the author "counsels" his readers on numerous spiritual topics but focuses primarily on the power and difficulty of prayer, the church in heaven and the church on Earth, and spiritual life and spiritual warfare.

Father John states that "sometimes during lengthy prayer only a few minutes are really pleasing to God and constitute true prayer." True prayer comes from the heart but too often "our heart falls asleep during prayer and only the outer man prays" with his lips. A spiritual "attitude" must be developed. This is achieved by learning how to pray effectively, which involves intent, training and discipline. If you become distracted by worldly cares during prayer, bring your attention back and return to the prayer's meaning with energy and feeling. Practice praying often, remembering that prayer is "spiritual breathing" and that the true power of prayer is in the way we pray rather than on the words we say.


Spiritual Counsels reminds us to pray not only for the living but also for the dead. But why pray for the departed? Father John answers: "in order that the remembrance of death may live in you, and that hope in the life to come, after death, may not become extinct in you; and

that your spirit may daily be humbled by the thought of the transitory nature of your life."

In our prayers, the author wants us to access all our resources: our Church in Heaven and our Church on Earth. The Church in Heaven includes not only our loving God and his son Jesus Christ, but our Immaculate Mary, the Mother of God, all the Saints, the apostles, martyrs, holy bishops, angels, and confessors. Their intercession and prayers for us are powerful and including them in our prayers teaches us to imitate their virtues.

In addition to the Church in Heaven, the Lord is also present to us through the Church on Earth. This includes the priest's blessings and prayers, the liturgy, holy sacraments, icons, and collective prayer.

Although Spiritual Counsels is an easy book to read, it is difficult in that its implications are stark. Life is difficult and often dark, filled with despair and conflict. Father John writes at length about spiritual darkness and warns that the Devil is cunning and induces us in many ways, some of which are through evil thoughts, words and deeds, through temptation, false beliefs, and despondency. Those yearning for a spiritual life must constantly guard against the evil spirit. This mental warfare requires constant awareness and self examination. Father John encourages us to face this conflict and not despair. We must develop "spiritual armor": the armor of God which is faith, hope and love. Fight all earthly attachment, for lusting after material pleasures leads to despair. Carnal man finds pleasure with food and drink, money, self love, self-praise, and gratification of the flesh. But it is the internal or spiritual delight which brings us closer to the light of God. True spiritual food is practicing love, kindness, humility, meekness, patience and forgiveness.


