Oratorical Festival Topics for 2020

Junior Division (Grades 7-9)

- 1. The Orthodox Church honors the Virgin Mary as the Theotokos. Discuss the role she plays in the Church and as a role model for all Christians.
- 2. Christ and many Church Fathers often criticized the wealthy. Do Christians need to live a life of poverty? Is it a sin to live a comfortable life?
- 3. "Lord have mercy" is the most repeated phrase in the Divine Liturgy. What does it mean to truly have mercy?
- 4. "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds from the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4; Deuteronomy 8:3). Discuss the importance of reading Scripture in your life.
- 5. The theme of the upcoming 2020 Clergy—Laity Congress is "the greatest of these is love" (1 Corinthians 13:13). Discuss the way St. Paul defines love in this important chapter of the Bible.

Senior Division (Grades 10-12)

- 1. Discuss how the separation of church and state benefits us as Orthodox Christians in the United States.
- 2. In his enthronement address, Archbishop Elpidophoros said, "We are all deacons." Discuss the importance of being a deacon a servant in the Church.
- 3. Discuss the significance of Constantinople in Church history and the struggles Orthodox Christians in Constantinople face today.
- 4. How have modern-day saints from the past 100 years, from St. Nektarios to St. Paisios and others, helped Orthodox Christians live their lives today?
- 5. "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares" (Hebrews 13:2). How might Orthodox Christians put this command into practice?

Having nothing, and yet possessing everything

2 Cor. 6:10: "We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet well known; as dying, and behold we live; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything."

One very obvious message we learn from the writings of St. Paul is that his life as a Christian missionary was no walk in the park. The above quote from his second letter to the Corinthians is one example.

From one perspective, his words show not just the extent of his sufferings, but the cruelty inflicted on him from both his own people, fellow Jews, and from the Roman government and military authorities.

In this particular passage, though, something else should be noted, otherwise his words might be taken as just another laundry list of complaints and disappointments that life can put in front of just about anyone.

What is that something else? The last two phrases reveal it most clearly: "As poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything."

These words do not come from a defeated heart, a "poor old me" attitude, a "nobody is hurting like I'm hurting" complainer or from someone who thinks life is just not fair. No, these words show that in spite of life's misfortunes, unfairness, pains and misery, St. Paul is anything but defeated. He knows that what he offers, as a Christian witness, teacher and evangelist, he possesses the most important message this world needs to hear; namely, that Christ, having risen from the dead, offers eternal life in Paradise to those who pick up their cross and follow Him.

Does St. Paul have wealth? Certainly not in terms of a hefty bank account or properties or toys. But what he does have is priceless; the knowledge, the deep faith, the

unwavering trust in God that not only keeps him moving forward with his missionary journeys, but causes him to look even at his persecutors as brothers and sisters, fellow human beings. He must share this gift given to him, this knowledge of Christ the Savior of the world, with everyone. His desire is that all people should be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth of the One, True God, revealed in the person of Jesus Christ, God's only-begotten Son.

This is why Paul can say he is punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor (from a worldly perspective) and yet making many rich (by teaching them about Christ), and as having His desire is that all people should be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth of the One, True God

nothing (again, from the worldly perspective) and yet possessing everything (everything that is needed for eternal life).

He is not putting on a phony, happy face. He expresses his sincere pain, both physical and emotional; but, he does not, can not, let that be a reason to quit. His purpose is too important, he must continue to teach, spread the Good News of Christ, turn the other cheek when people harm him, let alone refuse to listen.

This man was honest! Life was tough, very tough. But in each place where he taught, he found those who listened and were convinced, as well as those who refused to listen and hardened their hearts. Knowing that there were those who were open to his message, as well as the knowledge of the love (Christ) behind his message, is what kept him going and going and going.

Listen for this reading during the liturgy on Sunday, October 6. Reflect on the words, the man behind the words, and the message he felt so strongly about sharing.

How much do we really trust God? Where do we draw the line? Jesus repeatedly noted this lack of trust in His followers.

Luk 9:41 "You faithless and corrupt people! How long must I be with you and put up with you?"

Mat 6:25 "That is why I tell you not to worry about everyday life—whether you have enough food and drink, or enough clothes to wear. Look at the birds. They don't plant or harvest or store food in barns, for your heavenly Father feeds them. And aren't you far more valuable to him than they are? Can all your worries add a single moment to your life? "And why worry about your clothing? Look

"And why worry about your clothing? Look at the lilies of the field and how they grow. They don't work or make their clothing, yet Solomon in all his glory was not dressed as beautifully as they are. And if God cares so wonderfully for wildflowers that are here today and thrown into the fire tomorrow, he will certainly care for you. Why do you have so little faith? "So don't worry about these things, saying, 'What will we eat? What will we drink? What will we wear?' These things dominate the thoughts of unbelievers, but your heavenly Father already knows all your needs. Seek the Kingdom of God above all else, and do what is right, and he will give you everything you **need.** "So don't worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring its own worries. Today's trouble is enough for today.

He noticed that we, the people He created, do not really trust God but think that we are in control of our lives and our futures. We focus too much on making

ourselves happy and creating false securities. Financial stability, insurances, retirement, etc.... As a result of focusing on pleasing ourselves, we become miserable and thinking that we are in control only creates fear and anxiety within us over all the "WHAT IF'S" of the future and anger or despair when things don't go the way we planned.

1Pe 5:6 **Humble yourselves** therefore under the mighty hand of God, that in due time he may exalt you. **Cast all your anxieties on him**, for he cares about you.

1Ti 6:8 So if we have enough food and clothing, let us be content. But people who long to be rich fall into temptation and are trapped by many foolish and harmful desires that plunge them into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is the root of all kinds of evil. And some people, craving money, have wandered from the true faith and pierced themselves with many sorrows. But you, are God's children; so run from all these evil things. Pursue righteousness and a godly life, along with faith, love, perseverance, and gentleness. **Fight the good fight for the** true faith. Hold tightly to the eternal life to which God has called you.

Luk 9:23 Then he said to the crowd, "If any of you wants to be my follower, you must turn from your selfish ways, take up your cross daily, and follow me. If you try to hang on to your life, you will lose it. But if you give up your life for my sake, you will save it. And what do you benefit if you gain the whole world but are yourself lost or destroyed?

Jesus came to restore us and show us how to live the way He designed us to live, having total trust in the God the Father.

Seek the Kingdom of God above all else, and do what is right, and he will give you everything you need. If we focus on pleasing God, He will take care of us. God wants to be in control of our lives, both personally and as a
