Loving the Lord (continued from last month)

The second caution regarding a traits might truly be helpful, but Christian's personal relationship with Christ concerns something much more prevalent today than in times past; something found in Orthodox as well as non-Orthodox Christian communities. "My faith in God and relationship with Christ," as some would say today, "is real and meaningful, but I no longer have a need or desire for the Church."

The reasons behind such statements may be numerous and varied, and, in some cases, not without good cause. Bad clergy, for example, tend to drive members away, not just from a particular parish, but from the Church altogether. And, although it really shouldn't happen in church communities, we've all seen and heard heated arguments in which one party gets fed up and leaves, perhaps only to return following the departure of the other.

Who needs the arguments, gossip and rumors, the hypocrisy and phony attitudes? It's much easier just to walk away. And, many have. But, remarkably, many more have stayed.

What is it that keeps those parishioners active in their Church? Thick skin? Blinders? Eternal optimism? Each of those

there is, I believe, something else thrown into the mix; a characteristic I find common among Church veterans that not only keeps them coming back for more, week after week, but with an enduring humility that drives a desire to offer whatever they can for their Church.

Their secret is two-fold. They. first of all, understand human nature: that is, we are all individuals, and don't see everything the same way. (How boring life would be if we did!) But having different points of view doesn't have to be a negative. In fact, listening to what others have to say just may result in alternative solutions or creative possibilities never before considered.

They also understand that life is not easy, that we all deal with circumstances that challenge us physically, mentally and emotionally on a daily basis. Being human, we're sometimes going to have bad days, we're not going to get enough sleep, we're going to get cranky and demanding, and sometimes not very pleasant to be around.

But those days don't last forever, and they are not good reasons to end friendships, or to walk away from your Church

family. You wake up to a new day, regroup, apologize, and move on.

Secondly, our Church veterans stick around because somewhere along the line, although never having set foot in a seminary, they have learned an important theological lesson about the Church. They've learned that Christ and His Church are one. We don't separate them. Without quoting chapter and verse, they understand

the many New **Testament references** of the unique and sacred relationship between Christ and the Church.

It's quite a simple formula: Baptized Christians belong to a Church community. The Church is the community in which we live out our faith in Christ, put our God-given gifts to use, and receive the Holy Sacraments that are just not available apart from the Church.

Is the Church perfect? Let's be serious; it's run by people, perfection is not an option. But that does not make it any less holy or any less necessary. It has been, and always will be, the Church Christ established by His

Kitchen Improvements

Combination walk-in refrigerator/ freezer to be installed.

St. Haralambos Church continues to move forward with outfitting our building. At the August Parish Council meeting, bids were reviewed and approval was given to move forward with the installation of a combined walk-in refrigerator/freezer unit for the kitchen. The location is the space designated in the original building plans.

This step forward was made possible by the earmarking of funds generously donated in memory of David Frederickson and John Obren. May their memory be eternal. Several anonymous donors have also been instrumental in funding this project.

The total cost approved - including construction, installation, electrical, and fire-suppressant work - is about \$3,000 more than the funds that have been collected. Your generous contributions towards the completion of this work would be most welcome.

Work is expected to begin shortly and will be completed in time for Festival preparations.

The Desert Fathers tell the story of a monk who took a sack, filled it with sand, and carried it on his back over his shoulder. death and Resurrection for the salvation of our souls. We can decide to walk away from it with all the self-righteousness we can muster. But we should not delude ourselves into thinking that our departure from the Church is going to help resolve anything, or that it will somehow bring us into a more authentic relationship with the Lord.

Have you left the Church? Do you remember the reason why? Have you been the cause for someone else leaving the Church? Do you remember the reason why? My guess is that those reasons have long since faded away and no longer have the meaning they once did. Even in the rare case of a justified departure, it should be the cause for finding and joining another Church community, and not remaining apart from the Church. The two cautions about our relationship with Christ, presented in this and last month's newsletter, are by no means the only situations we should be aware of. What is so helpful about being part of the Orthodox Christian Church is the knowledge that whatever problems we face today, that cause harm to our relationship with Christ, have all been faced by previous generations as well.

To maintain the healthiest balance in our Christian walk is to place our feet along the same path as the saints who have come before, and who struggled as we do today in learning to become genuine and committed followers of Christ. During their lives of persecution and struggle, they managed never to forget what the Church continuously teaches: Christ is in our midst.

Excerpted from <u>God Speaks from the</u> <u>Cross</u>, Coniaris, Anthony M. 1984

A person's last words can reveal much about the person's entire life. For example, P.T. Barnum's last words were: "What were today's receipts?" From the cross we hear our Savior's last words -"words of tenderness and love... forgiveness and peace...anguish and loneliness, faith and trust."

Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do.

"It wasn't unusual for crucified persons to cry out" hysterically, cursing with pain, yelling "terrible blasphemies." But from the Lord's heart came a "soft, sweet... prayer of...forgiveness," not words of bitterness, but words of compassion.

"If He had mercy for those who nailed Him to the cross, then He will have mercy on us, too. But first we must say, 'God, be merciful to me, the sinner."

Lord, remember me when you come into your kingdom.

When we die, what keeps us from being forgotten "is our faith that God will remember us for all eternity." All of us are represented by one of the two thieves— "either we believe in Christ or reject Him. Our eternal destiny depends on that decision."

Woman, behold thy son.

"The mutual concern Mary and John... have for each other is but a small example of what the Church as the household of God is all about. It is a body of brothers and sisters in Christ who...bear one another's burdens."

It is finished.

This was "not a cry of defeat but of victory. God's love for us is fulfilled. This cry has to be the greatest good news ever announced to human kind. He... redeemed the world from sin and death. The gateway to life is open."

I thirst.

Jesus "thirsts not just for water. He thirsts to give us His Kingdom, the water of life."...He thirsts for our obedience...for our repentance, for our return." Many of us thirst for "money, pleasure... popularity" but not for Jesus.

On the last page of the Bible are Jesus' words: "Let him who is thirsty come, let him who desires, take the water of life without price." (Rev. 22:17).

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

"How often this agonizing question WHY? is asked of God...WHY cancer? WHY hunger? WHY war? This was a cry of abandonment, "but not a cry of despair. The soul that despairs does not cry out to God...as MY God. It was an affirmation of trust in God."


When a boy was killed, the father asked the priest, "Where was God when my son was killed?" The priest replied, "God was just where He was

when His own Son was killed. He was preparing a resurrection.'"

Father, into Thy hands I commend my spirit.

Like Jesus, Christians fall asleep into "the everlasting, all-powerful, all-loving arms" of the Father. Jesus "taught us not only how to live, but also how to die."

Of course, we know that the Lord rose "from the dead to live forever and to give eternal life to all who would believe in Him."



Mortgage Offering Tray

Second offering tray for Mortgage to be discontinued, but need to pay down Mortgage remains.

Last year we began the practice of a second offering tray specifically designated for the building fund and retiring our mortgage. This practice will be discontinued.

The monthly mortgage payment for our Church is \$7,790. This amount is offset by the mortgage payment to us in the amount of \$3,321 from the sale of our 84th Avenue property and the rental payment from the AT&T tower, leaving a net of approximately \$3.470 each month. The collections from passing the second tray have not significantly offset this expense.

An additional concern is that the current re-negotiation of the tower lease with AT&T will probably result in a reduction of income to our Church. What we have learned during our negotiations is that this income should not be relied upon long-term.

Fortunately, we held a successful festival last year that provided us with the funds needed to cover our mortgage and other operating expenses. We pray that our 2011 Festival will be equally successful.

However, relying on the Festival to ensure we can cover our mortgage and other operating expenses is both dangerous, and not Orthodox.

Dangerous, in that if we were to experience a drop-off in attendance, we could potentially be short on required funds. Not Orthodox in the sense that the Church should not be financed from external sources, but by our Tithes.

We are also fortunate that we own the land at 75th and Greenway, which we have voted to sell. We have already received a few inquiries. However, as we are all aware, due to the current economic circumstances, timing will not be to our advantage. We also have the dilemma that holding out for a better price may also cost us more in the longer term as we continue to pay the interest on our Mortgage.

Demographically, Greek Orthodox Christians are the second wealthiest denomination in the US. In terms of Stewardship, we are also the second lowest. Nationally, Christians average \$880/person in giving. Greek Orthodox Christians average \$137/ person. Fortunately, St. Haralambos Parishioners are much more generous. We reached 172 Stewards in 2010 and our average pledge was \$636. If we just met the average giving for all Christian denominations, we would have netted an additional \$42,000, which would have covered the net difference on our mortgage expense!

We believe that Stewardship is the answer. Stewardship in terms of Time,

Talent, and Treasure; and there is a time and place for all three of these pillars. Sunday Liturgy is not the place for us to emphasize the last, and for this reason we will no longer pass a second tray earmarked for the building fund/mortgage.

As 2011 ends, consider your Stewardship of His Church. We recognize that times are difficult, filled with economic uncertainty. However, when we made the decision to move forward, we did so with a Leap of Faith and the Lord guided us to our new Church home. Our vision was to grow this Parish and ultimately, some day, God willing, build a Byzantine-style edifice to worship in. That vision remains only a dream until we complete the first step and retire the current mortgage.

Parishioners wishing to make a weekly contribution towards the mortgage may do so by placing their offering in the tray with your intention noted on the envelope, or by depositing their offering in the box designated for this purpose located in the Narthex. Also, we will continue the practice of a designated offering for the International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC) on the third Sunday of each month. Last month, your generosity allowed us to send IOCC a check for \$151.


