Answer: 23 years.


### Q: Are you a native Arizonan?

I also remember picking up Father Michael & Presvytera Kristin from the airport when they first arrived and welcoming them to our community. I also can't forget the all-nighters we pulled getting the kitchen built for the first festival at our old location.

# Q: What would you like to see happen in the next 5-10 years of our parish?

A: I would like to see a stronger commitment and sacrifice from all of us to Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. Being of one mind and spirit, focused not on pleasing ourselves, but doing the things that are most pleasing to God. Doing charitable acts without calling attention to ourselves. These are the good deeds that are rewarded by God. Building a new Church should not be a goal in and of itself, rather a byproduct of all of these actions.

# Q: What legacy would you like today's parishioners to develop and leave for future generations during the next 25 years?

**A:** We need to work to get it right, as much as humanly possible, each and every day. The only legacy that counts is if the Lord upon his coming can say to us, "Well done good and faithful servants, enter into the joy of your Master." ### From Japan to a Taste of Greece

This summer I had the opportunity to travel to Japan to visit our son who is stationed in Okinawa. The Japanese impressed me with their unbelievable customer service and efficiency. For example, on arrival it took us only 40 minutes to clear immigration and claim our bags. On our return, the same process in Los Angeles took over two hours. We found Okinawans to be very friendly and welcoming, and Tokyo to be unbelievably crowded! And, yes, I mastered the use of chopsticks.

During our stay we visited many interesting places, toured many of the most important landmarks and learned much about the Japanese culture. Of particular interest to me was Tokyo's Sensoji Temple. Besides the very large and impressive temple and pagoda, there was a busy marketplace nearby where one could buy most anything. Near the Temple is a large fire pit where people write their prayers on a piece of paper and then offer them up as incense. Also nearby is a fountain where one dips one of many small metal cups, sips and rinses their mouth, spitting the water out in the drain around the fountain. Observing this ritual and seeing hundreds of people drinking from the same cups fascinated me since the Japanese are remarkably conscientious of sanitation.

Our tour guide explained to us how the faithful believe that the wafting smoke emanating from the pit and the water from the fountain are rites of purification. I learned that Buddhism is polytheistic, and the Japanese are flexibly multireligious. They combine Shintoism, which focuses on the living, with Buddhism for answers to the after-life.

As I walked the Temple grounds I wondered to myself how it is possible that so many obviously faithful people have not heard of or perhaps considered Christ's message. And then I reflected how the nearby marketplace was not all that different from Arrowhead Mall. Good people living their lives, going about their business, yet unaware of Christ's love.

In a recent report, "Global Index of Religiosity and Atheism – 2012," 31% of Japanese consider themselves atheist, and another 31% consider themselves non-religious, leaving a smaller percentage of religious. In this same research conducted by the Gallup organization, the U. S. was reported to be 30% non-religious, 5% undecided, 5% atheist, and 60% as religious. Not so bad in comparison, however, the trend is concerning as just 7 years ago, 73% of Americans considered themselves to be religious; a drop of 13% since 2005.

Our Parish Mission Statement states we are "A loving Christ-centered community whose mission is to keep, practice and proclaim our Orthodox Christian Faith as a living presence to those around us." If the survey is accurate, four in ten of our neighbors are not presently religious and many of them may be seeking to know Jesus.

In late October we will again be hosting our annual Taste of Greece Festival. We all understand how the income from our festival covers the gap between our Stewardship income and our operating expenses. However, if the only reason that we host our Festival is to make the money needed to pay our bills, we are missing the point.

A few weeks ago Fr. Michael began his sermon speaking about how one of his


As we prepare for our 2012 Taste of Greece Festival, let's think about our

<u>The Illumined Heart</u> by Frederica Mathewes-Green, 2001

"Illumine our hearts, O Master who lovest mankind, with the pure light of thy divine knowledge, and open the eyes of our minds to the understanding of thy Gospel teachings....for thou art the illumination of our soul and bodies, O Christ our God." (Prayer before the reading of the Gospel Liturgy of St. James, Fourth Century)

In "The Illumined Heart," Frederica Mathewes-Green draws from the world views and wisdom of the early Christians to discuss current challenges on such topics as repentance, fasting, and prayer. She uses the image of an athlete to refer to Christians whose ultimate journey is "theosis" — to be filled with the presence of God. This analogy was frequently used by St. Paul to refer to the spiritual and lifelong training necessary to "be in Christ."

Repentance is the first step toward theosis. The author writes, "Repentance enlarges the heart... and the sorrow tendered to God is no longer for ourselves alone.... With all creation we groan, crying out to God for his healing and mercy." Repentance is not the same as sadness; Abba Isaiah believed that sadness was sinful because it sapped ones' strength. The author however writes that sadness is joy...."it does not weigh on the soul, but says to it 'Do not be afraid! Up! Return! God knows that man is weak, and strengthens him." Other reflections on repentance include that repentance is insight rather than emotion and that it involves knowledge and clarity.

In addition, the athlete questing toward theosis must find exercises to strengthen self-control and self-direction. The author writes that "the most basic exercise is fasting." Fasting disciplines the body, which, in turn, helps to discipline the

mind and ward off temptation. Like physical exercise, fasting is meant to "strengthen the Christian, not break him." The author quotes the Didache "if you are able to bear the Lord's yoke in its entirety, you will be perfect, if you are not able, then do what you can. And in the matter of food, do what you can stand." Other forms of self-discipline can involve abstaining from pursuits of pleasure or activities of self- indulgence. Similar to fasting from food, this quieting of the impulses and taming of passions leads to healthier living and serves as "a way of honoring creation and preparing for eternity."

An ultimate union with Christ is not possible without prayer. Prayer is difficult because it requires incredible mental discipline. The art of vigilance and the focus required to pray are not easy. Wandering thoughts distract and scatter us. Saint Nicodemus tells us to attempt prayer from the heart, "placing [one's] mind within the heart and, without speaking with the mouth, but only with inner words spoken in the heart, saying this brief and single prayer: 'Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me.' Repeating this prayer throughout the day drives out "aimless chatter that would otherwise occupy [us]....and as a result the passions are subdued....murmuring like a brook, the prayer becomes the background music of every other thought and deed in life. It beats in the heart through long years..."

The book includes a beautiful prayer from Nikolai Velimirovic, who was a Serbian bishop. It is about forgiving our enemies and is very moving. This small book, full of wit, wisdom, and humor is a pleasure to read and is an essential for anyone striving to strengthen their faith.
