The Spiritual Journey of Great Lent

CLERGY



Great Lent in the Orthodox Christian Church is a seven -week journey of physical, mental and spiritual exercise designed to help grow and mature as Christians in preparation of the celebration of our Lord's Resurrection from the dead. Though the first day of Lent falls on Monday, the Church calls us together the night before with the beautiful Vespers of Forgiveness, held at 6pm on Sunday, Mar. 17. This service provides us with the opportunity to forgive others, as well as to ask forgiveness from one another, prior to the start of our Lenten Journey.

We are called to focus on three primary disciplines during the Lenten Journey: Prayer, Fasting, and Works of Charity. The following is meant as an aid to help understand each of them, as well as offering practical examples of putting them into practice.

Prayer

Before meals, at the start of the day, for the health of others, in times of sorrow or for expressing thanks, prayer is our time with God. Either with the aid of printed prayers or in our own words, the first discipline of the Lenten Journey is prayer. Try to establish a daily Rule of Prayer. This means praying at the same time each day or each evening. It might be difficult at first, but stick with it, make it a priority, and you'll find it becomes more fulfilling as time goes on.

The questions about prayer that many ask typically have to do with wondering whether or not God is really listening, and whether or not we will hear an answer. The answer the Church has consistently offered is yes, God always hears and answers prayers, but not always in the way or at a time we expect. Know that God is always listening to your prayers, and make your prayer time as peaceful as possible with no distractions.

Fasting

"And when you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces that their fasting may be seen by men. Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward. But when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, that your fasting may not be seen by men but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you." (Matt.6:16-18)

The Orthodox Church has continually taught the

benefits of fasting especially during Great Lent. It is not meant as a weight-loss system, and shouldn't be seen in a negative light as not being able to eat this or that type of food.

from the Church, as a form of personal discipline, to learn the benefits of having more control over the food we eat.

Orthodox Christianity also teaches that fasting is not just about food, but behavior as well. St. John Chrysostom writes: "...for the honor of fasting consists not in abstinence from food, but in withdrawing from sinful practices; since he who limits his fasting only to an abstinence from meats, is one who especially disparages it. Do you fast? Give me proof of it by your works!"

Although fasting is limiting both the amount and types of food we eat, if we still keep anger, hatred and envy in our heart we have missed the point. Why? Because

proper fasting teaches us to be more concerned with our spiritual growth, becoming more like Christ. If our behavior - towards God and one another does not change as a result of our fasting, all we've done is change our diet.

Fasting is not meant to make us sick, but it should teach us at least two things: 1) we typically don't need as much food as we're used to eating; and 2) learning to control the desires of the flesh helps us to focus more on our spiritual growth.

Start your Lenten Fast with prayer, asking God to strengthen your discipline during Lent. Enjoy, in moderation, fastfree foods such as fruits, vegetables, shellfish, grains, legumes and nuts. Remember that your Fast is between you and God; there is no benefit either to comparing yourself with anyone else or judging the fasting of another.

Works of Charity

"Truly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me." (Matt. 25:40)

Stewardship

We ask and encourage all our parish families to send in the Stewardship form each year, together with their offerings of time, talents and treasure. If Saint Haralambos Church is the church you regularly attend, please consider becoming a steward, one who not only supports the church financially, but also with involvement in parish ministries and activities.

There are no Membership Dues in the Orthodox Church, there is no required minimum or maximum for offerings. Our offerings show our care for the continued functioning of our Church. In addition, being a parish steward fulfills the Archdiocese requirements of being a Member in Good Standing, allowing you to serve as godparents and sponsors for Orthodox sacraments.

Our financial contributions should be a percentage of our financial resources. This continues the biblical teaching on deciding an appropriate amount each year. It is fair because percentage giving is not a fixed amount applicable to all families, and it is biblical because of the teaching of the tithe, or a 10% gift back to the Church. Above all, our giving should be cheerfully given, recognizing our desire - not simply obligation - to give back to God a portion of our blessings we receive from Him.



Treasurer's Report

We have been blessed with an amazing year so far and have exciting news!

The church now has the ability to accept stock donations through our Wells Fargo Advisor Harry Calivas. Contact the church office for details.

Through the hard work and dedication of our President Ray Wysmierski, we have closed the Lease Purchase of the Cell Tower. This netted the church \$280K which will be used to pay off the remaining \$29K on the Portico and \$48K on the FEMA/DHS capital improvement projects. We should be able to balance the budget with a positive number for the first time in several years, while returning money into our savings.

\$150K in funds was invested in a short term CD at 4.87% APR to provide additional income from the interest. We will continue to find other investment options in the interim.

In addition to the above blessings, we have also been gifted estate funds from two Sisters in Christ. May their Memory be Eternal.

Coming up are two more projects needing financing; an adult baptismal font and Icons for our Narthex. We are working with Father Michael to finalize the funding needed.

Due to the age of the building, a proposal is in process to repair our front door hinges once the Portico is completed.

The Church Fundraiser planning for May 11 is in process and deposits have been made.


